- 3) To advocate for policy reform so that diapers, period supplies, and incontinence products are included in the definition of, and provision for, the “basic human needs” of families.

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Founded in 2004, The Diaper Bank of Connecticut (DBCT) provides free basic health needs including diapers, period supplies, and incontinence products to low-income individuals and families throughout Connecticut by servicing families through our flagship Diaper Distribution Network (DDN). DBCT distributes these basic needs through a strategic network of over 165 existing service providers serving low-income families where they are often already receiving other support services, such as: hospitals, local food pantries, soup kitchens, childcare centers, social service agencies, and shelters.

In 2023, DBCT distributed 6,489,385 diapers throughout the state. Our objective is to keep infants clean, dry, and healthy, improve a family's overall wellbeing, and provide diapers to families who need them most. Having access to diapers improves babies' overall health, reducing instances of diaper rash, urinary tract infections and other medical problems. It also has been shown to improve mothers' mental health and family dynamics- by relieving a recurring, continual stressor. By providing diapers to families, we help them on a path toward economic stability. Parents cannot use childcare without an adequate supply of diapers, so many who can't afford diapers end up missing work or school. Our goal is to help these families so they're better equipped to get on more solid financial footing. This will make them less reliant on public assistance programs in the future, all while improving babies' health and home lives.

DBCT serves as a model nationwide by transforming the accessibility and delivery system of basic health needs. In addition to our flagship diaper distribution program, we have 3 additional programs: Beam, Rise, and Shine. Through Beam, we distribute period supplies to menstruators in need. Through Shine, we provide incontinence products to youths between the ages of 3 and 20 who need them due to medical conditions. Through Rise, we distribute adult incontinence products to those individuals in need.

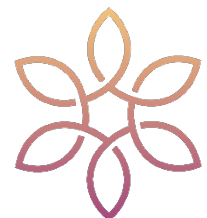

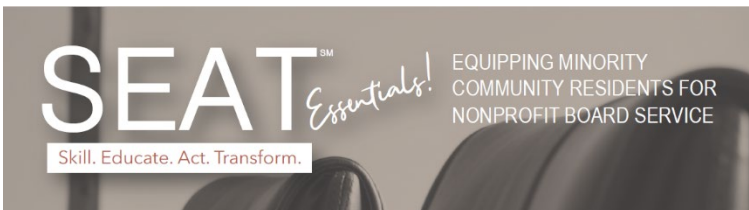
